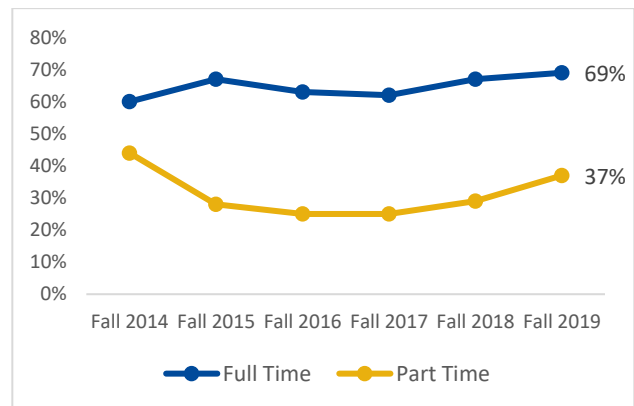
Student Success: Retention, Graduation, and Transfer-Out Data

Student Retention

For the purposes of this report, only first-time students are included in the retention cohorts. Students who transferred into the institution are not included. Illus. 6.1 shows first to second year retention for Mid-Plains Community College students initially enrolled in the Fall term indicated in the parenthesis, in the table below, and re-enrolling in the following Fall term. Illus. 6.2 and 6.3 provide the same data for MPCC Cohort schools for the academic year 2019-20. 2020-21 data is provided for Mid-Plains Community College only.

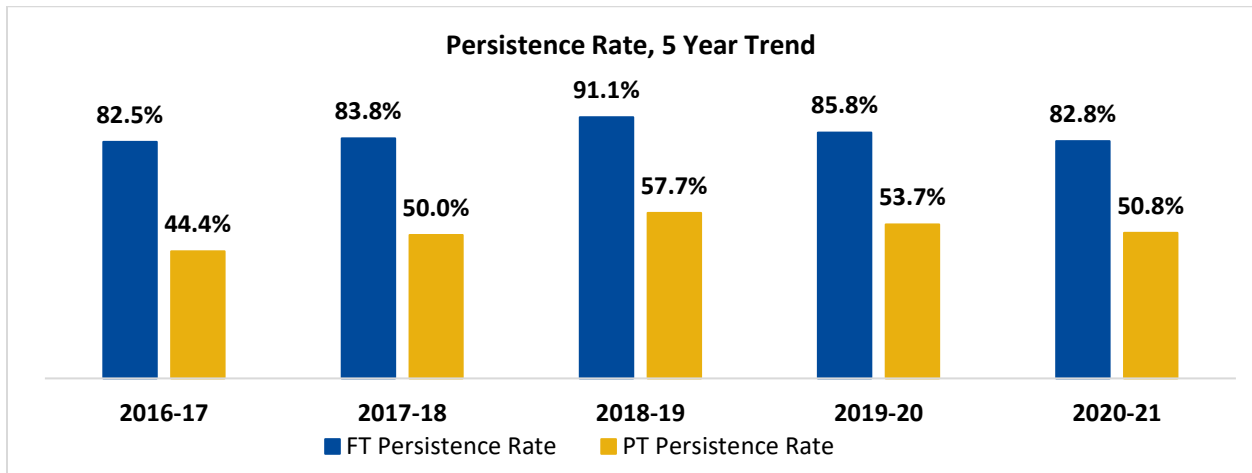

PERSISTENCE RATES

Illus. 6.4 provides persistence data on the first time students enrolled for the fall term who are seeking an award (Associate Degree, Diploma, or Certificate). Persistence is defined as the percentage of students who enrolled in the fall; that, a) return the following spring semester or b) graduate in the fall term.

COURSE COMPLETION AND SUCCESS RATES

Illus. 6.5 provides a summary of course completion, success rates, and withdrawals for students enrolled in credit courses during the Fall semesters of academic years 2015-16 through 2019-20. Illus. 6.6 is a summary of course completion, success rates, and withdrawals by division for the most recently completed Fall term, 2019-20. The same information for developmental courses for the same academic years is shown in Illus. 6.7 and 6.8. For these tables, course completion rate is defined as courses complete at the end of the term that include grades coded as A, A+, B, B+, C, C+, D, D+, F, I, P, or NP. Success rate represents students who enrolled in courses during the Fall term and completed the course with a grade of A, A+, B, B+, C, C+, or P. Nonsuccesses are those coded as D, D+, F, I, NP, or W. I=Incomplete, NP=Not Passing, P=Passing, and W=Withdrawal. Courses with no grade (labs) are not included in this analysis.

ACADEMIC PROBATION AND SUSPENSION

A student will be placed on academic probation whenever the student’s academic performance falls below MPCC’s established minimum requirements. The minimum requirements during the 2019-20 academic year were: a 1.5 cumulative GPA through the first 15 GPA hours, a 1.75 for 16-30 GPA hours, and 2.0 for 31 GPA hours or more. Any student placed on academic probation who fails to meet the academic standards stated above by the end of the probationary semester will be placed on suspension. After a student has received academic suspension, the student may not re-enroll for a period of one academic year. Students who have extenuating circumstances may appeal suspensions by notifying the Area Vice President for Student Affairs in writing within five days after receipt of the suspension letter. Illus. 6.9 and 6.10 provide a five-year look at academic probation and suspension at MPCC.

Illustration 6.12: 2015-16 to 2019-20 Percent of Students with Honors Compared to Annual Headcount

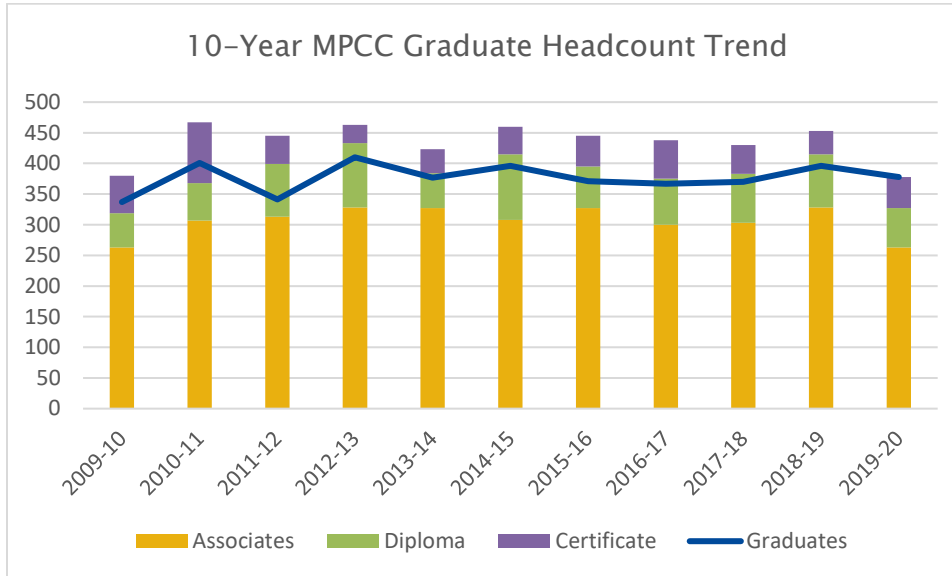

GRADUATION RATE BREAKOUT

Graduation Rate for federal reporting requirements, which is published on the NCES/IPEDS website “College Navigator” is calculated based upon the percentage of full-time, first-time in college, degree or certificate seeking cohort (group of students) from a given fall snapshot that earn an award within 150% of normal time (3 years for associate degree, 2 years for diploma, 1-1 ½ years for certificate).

- For students who began their studies in 2016, Mid-Plains Community College (MPCC) reported a 41% graduation rate which put MPCC **second** in the state among the Nebraska Community Colleges.
- 41% put MPCC **fifth** among the 15 peer institutions which are also rural, multi-campus institutions with similar enrollment from the Midwest.

TRANSFER-OUT RATE BREAKOUT

Transfer-out Rate is based upon the same cohort as the Graduation Rate and measures the percentage of that cohort that has transferred to another postsecondary institution within three years for schools that have transfer as part of their mission.

- Mid-Plains Community College (MPCC) reported a 16% transfer-out rate for the 2016 cohort.
- MPCC was **fifth** in Nebraska among the 6 Community Colleges.
- MPCC was **twelfth** among peer institutions (16%). Coffeyville CC was first with 35% and Allen County CC was second with 30%.

COMMUNITY COLLEGE SUCCESS RATE

Combining those students whom either graduated or transferred-out over three years, MPCC ranked **second** in the state and **tied for sixth** among IPEDS peer institutions with a success rate of 57%.

*Please note that starting with the 2020-21 report, the year of the report was changed to reflect the academic year in which the Trends and Statistics report was completed, rather than the academic year in which the data was available. Therefore the 2019-20 Trends and Statistics report was renamed the 2020-21 Trends and Statistics.
